Student and Early Career Luncheon

On Wednesday (June 8th), the students and early career professional committee (SECPC) hosted a luncheon sponsored by The MENTOR Network and REM Minnesota. Fifty complimentary tickets were distributed during conference registration for this event. As in years past, AAIDD Board Members, Fellows, and AAIDD staff were invited to sit among the students and early career professionals. This provided a unique opportunity for informal collegial interactions.

This year's luncheon speaker was Dr. Elizabeth Perkins, from University of South Florida. Dr. Perkins is a Research Assistant Professor and Health Coordinator at the Florida Center for Inclusive Communities (FCIC), USF's University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities. She earned her PhD in Aging Studies and a BA in Psychology, both from USF. Dr. Perkins is also a RNMH, a registered nurse from Great Britain, where she was trained specifically in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). She has held several leadership roles at both a state and national levels and currently serves as the president of AAIDD's Gerontology Division.

Dr. Perkins shared her clinical experiences in the field of geriatric and residential care in her presentation titled: "Aging: We Can't Escape it – So Why Not Embrace it?" She referenced her current areas of interest which include medical aspects of aging with IDD and quality of life issues of staff and family caregivers of adults with IDD. She spoke about how professionals should focus on peoples' abilities, remove barriers, overcome stigma and preconceived expectations for people who are aging with IDD.

Liz's presentation was very well received by attendees at the SECPC luncheon. She was quite a hit!

Poster Session

The poster session was held Tuesday evening of the conference in conjunction with a food and beverage reception. Over 100 posters were displayed on topics across the spectrum. The SECPC had two posters on display this year. One poster was a Wordle word cloud created using descriptions or words submitted by the members of the SECPC about what committee membership means to them. The most prominent words pictured were: networking, collaboration, and leadership.

Cuba Delegation Student Scholarship Winner

CONGRATULATIONS Kerri Nowell!

The Student and Early Career Professional Committee (SECPC) assisted AAIDD with a student scholarship opportunity for the Cuba Research Delegation scheduled in October '11. SECPC hosted a conference call in conjunction with Professionals Abroad to explain the trip and scholarship competition. Interested students were asked to submit a cover letter proving he/she meets the eligibility criteria by being enrolled in a graduate program at the time of the application and during the delegation. They were also required to submit a one-page essay describing their research interest in Cuba and plans for disseminating knowledge gained while on the research delegation. The scholarship will cover the delegate program costs of the trip.



Kerri Nowell is a school psychology doctoral student at the University of Houston (UH) in Texas. Prior to beginning her doctoral training, she worked as a Licensed Specialist in School Psychology (LSSP; specialist level school psychologist) in public schools and subsequently as a clinician at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM)/Texas Children's Hospital (TCH). Kerri just completed her first year in the doctoral program at UH.

While in Cuba, Kerri plans on completing research related to service delivery models. Though the majority of her recent work has focused on assessment of children/adolescents with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) with and without cooccurring intellectual disability (ID), her primary interest centers on improving identification of ASD/ID and ensuring provisions of appropriate services in underserved populations. Because limited information is available regarding service delivery models for children with ASD in Cuba, she would like to research the types and availability of services and the process of determining eligibility for such services.

Kerri plans on submitting her findings for publication and presenting the data at various conferences focusing on service delivery for children/adolescents with disabilities. SECPC wishes her well on her trip and looks forward to hearing more about this research when she returns.

Postdoctoral Research Highlight


Hello! My name is Nancy Miodrag and I am entering my third year as a postdoctoral research fellow at the Vanderbilt Kennedy Center (VKC), in Nashville Tennessee. The VKC is a Eunice Kennedy Shriver Intellectual and Developmental **Disabilities Research Center (IDDRC)** dedicated to improving the quality of life of persons with various intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). Since 2009, I have had the pleasure of working with my mentors, Drs. Elisabeth Dykens and Bob Hodapp, who have made great advances to the field of behavioral and family research in I/DD. Working at the VKC has allowed me to pursue my interest in stress and coping in families of persons with genetic syndromes.

In Dr. Dykens' lab, I study withinand between-group differences in families and children with Prader-Willi syndrome (PWS) and Williams syndrome (WS). My work involves identifying factors that may influence health and well-being with specific interests in psychological stress, depression, anxiety, physical health, behaviors specific to the child's phenotype, as well as positive internal states such as optimism and coping. Interventions to help families and children address their challenges have also been a keen interest of mine. This summer, I initiated a pilot project teaching mindfulness-based stress reduction techniques to adults with WS and ASD at our 2011 ACM Lifting Lives Music Camp. Our team collected behavioral (mood) and physiological (salivary cortisol) data to get a glimpse of how an empirically-based stress reduction intervention affects mood and stress. The response from campers was overwhelmingly positive and we look forward to studying mindfulness practice and its potential to decrease negative psychological states and increase positive ones in individuals with WS and other syndromes.

With Dr. Hodapp, I have used largescale, linked administrative datasets (i.e., birth, death, and hospital discharge records) from the state of Tennessee to examine health and hospitalization in mothers and children with Down syndrome and spina bifida. To date, very little is known about a number of fundamental and critical issues in these families:

- Does parent-family stress contribute to health-related outcomes?
- How do children's early health and hospitalization affect parents' own health and hospitalization?
- What psychosocial and family-structure variables predict parent well-being?

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Postdoctoral Research Highlight continued...

Most recently, we conducted a study on early death in Down syndrome, to be published in the special issue on Death and Dying in the Journal of Applied Research in Intellectual Disabilities.

Overall, I could not have asked for a better post-doctoral experience. Drs. Dykens and Hodapp have provided me with excellent conceptual, methodological, and statistical expertise, mentoring in an area of I/DD that has always intrigued me. I hope my research will work towards transcending stress-coping research by making real-world advances to the health of families of children with I/DD. It has been an absolute pleasure working with my mentors, the research team and graduate students, VKC staff, and the families who share so much of their lives with us. I look forward to another productive year.



Doctoral Study Opportunity

Project LEAD: Preparing Leaders in Special Education, Access, and Databased Decision Making in High-Need Schools

The purpose of **Project LEAD** is to prepare knowledgeable, dynamic leaders in the field of special education who have expertise in supporting students with disabilities to gain access to the general education curriculum in high-need schools. Project LEAD involves

a) collaboration among faculty and doctoral students from the Departments of Special Education and other units in the college (i.e., Curriculum and Instruction, the Center for Education in Small Urban Communities);
b) facilitating relationships between participants and leading researchers in the field of special education; and
c) developing intimate linkages with highneed schools locally and in Chicago.

Project LEAD emphasizes five competency areas related to access to the general education curriculum:

- Disability law and education policy
- Improving outcomes through research and data-based decisions
- Collaborative practices between regular and special educators in inclusive environments
- Universal design for learning (UDL)
- Service learning

Doctoral Program Support

- Paid tuition
- A yearly stipend for full-time 11-month participation
- Annual stipend for conference attendance and research materials

Program Requirements

The Doctoral Program in Special Education at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign requires 64 credit hours beyond the master's degree. Specialization in access to the general education curriculum will be achieved through:

- *Coursework*: existing courses and newly created Advanced Topics courses on access;
- *Participation in the LEAD Seminar*: bimonthly meetings on research, teaching, and service issues related to educating students in high-need schools;,
- *Technology:* use of videoconferencing to engage with national and state experts; opportunities to use assistive and instructional technologies that promote access; and
- *Participation in traineeships*: research, teaching, and service learning process on access in high need schools;
- *Early research and dissertation:* an early research project and dissertation focused on access to the general education curriculum in high need schools.

Traineeship Experiences

Participants in LEAD complete a 20-hour *paid* traineeship each semester that focuses on research, teaching, or personnel preparation (depending on the semester) and allows collaboration with key faculty and leaders in the special and general education communities. Five types of traineeships are offered:

- Collaborative research experiences with the trainee's advisors on topics related to access to the general education curriculum
- Research experiences addressing access to the general education curriculum in high need schools
- Teaching experiences in university courses
- Supervision experiences with student teachers in high need schools
- Completion of a service learning project on access to the general education curriculum

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Doctoral Program Eligibility

To be eligible for the LEAD program, a doctoral student must have:

- A Master's degree in special education or a related field
- U.S. citizenship or permanent U.S. residency
- A minimum grade point average of 3.0 out of 4.0
- 2 or more years of experience with individuals with disabilities in school or community settings
- Goals consistent with the program
- A strong interest in research in the area of access to the general education curriculum

Doctoral Program Application Process

Students and Early Career Professionals

The AAIDD Annual Meeting provides a unique opportunity to become involved in the field, develop leadership skills, and network. We encourage students and early career professionals to come present and take the opportunity of this meeting to promote their work. A limited number of student and early career professional scholarships will be available on a competitive basis—to be considered for a scholarship, a student/early career professional must be the first author on a paper or poster proposal and indicate that they would like to be considered for a scholarship on the proposal submission form.

Proposals Sought

High quality proposals are sought that focus on one topic area or that can bridge research, practice, and policy. We strongly encourage authors of proposals that are research-only, practice-only or policy-only focused to express how they will relate their single focus to the remaining two foci (research to practice and policy, practice to research and policy, or policy to research and practice). Proposals will be competitively reviewed-not all proposals will be accepted. Due to the limited number of concurrent session slots, no individual author will be permitted to present more than two paper presentations on which s/he is first author. Also because of the limited number of paper presentation opportunities, the review panel may determine it necessary to offer a presentation format different from that initially proposed by the author(s) (e.g., poster presentation instead of paper presentation).

- Poster Presentations
- Pre and Post-Conference Sessions
- Media and Resource Presentations

AAIDD offers an International Electronic membership for members residing outside of the U.S. or Canada for \$50, which offers electronic access to both *AJIDD* and *IDD* journals. Members at this level cannot hold office or vote in AAIDD

elections.

AAIDD offers a Basic membership for \$75, which offers electronic access to *AJIDD* or *IDD* journals. Basic members are eligible to hold office and vote in AAIDD elections.
